# Study Psychology

Psychology is a rapidly evolving and fascinating discipline.

At ANU, you will study psychology with some of the best teachers and most acknowledged research and professional leaders in psychology worldwide. Importantly, our educational programs are driven by the research we are doing ourselves in key areas such as cognition and perception, social psychology, human development across the life-span, neuropsychology and neuroscience, as well as more applied areas of study such as clinical and health psychology, forensic psychology, and organisational psychology. Our psychology students have the opportunity to study right through from undergraduate and Honours to the graduate level.

## Why ANU

Where you get your degree in psychology makes a difference. ANU is consistently recognised as one of the great universities of the world. Located in the nation's capital city, our founding mission in 1946 was to be a national resource—a trusted intellectual powerhouse of research and education that would advance Australia's capability and position on a global scale.

We are honoured to be ranked as Australia's leading university by the measures that matter:

Our academics at ANU have the highest concentration of Fellowships of the Learned Academies (including the prestigious Royal Society of London) of any Australian university, and very importantly, our research in many areas is making a real difference in people's lives.

## What makes us different?

The staff in psychology at ANU get to know our students and we treat them as individuals. Our first-year courses have around 400 students—far fewer than in most other Australian universities—and we keep our laboratory classes to no more than 30 students.

Our elite Honours (fourth) year allows around 40-60 of our top students each year to study psychology at a higher level and under the individual supervision of members of staff.

Our staff are committed to teaching and research and often the science our academics teach is the science they are personally involved in researching. Several of our academics have been awarded national teaching prizes, and the research of our academics is well above world standard (earning a 4 out of 5 rating on the last Commonwealth Excellence in Research for Australia review).

# Undergraduate degrees in Psychology

There is a seamless transition from most college and high school programs into psychology at ANU. There are no secondary school prerequisites (such as maths or biology) for any of our undergraduate programs in psychology. Psychology can be studied in a variety of degrees. Some allow students greater flexibility with subject choice, and others provide research opportunities in later years. Additionally there is great flexibility for students to focus on subjects outside of psychology in their area of interest. All of the undergraduate programs listed below enable students to pursue Honours, and the graduate studies in psychology required to practice as a psychologist. Students should note, however, that entry into Honours is based upon strong academic performance throughout their undergraduate study.

There are many ways that you can study psychology as an undergraduate degree. Some examples are below.

## **Bachelor of Science (Psychology)**

This is a specialist three-year degree in psychology, providing an excellent overall grounding in the field of psychology. It enables students to undertake additional courses in the sciences if desired, or to undertake electives in arts and social sciences if a humanities focus is preferred. There is also an opportunity for students to use the electives in this program to pursue additional psychology courses. This degree provides a comprehensive education in both the topics and methods of psychology – while also providing other essential skills, such as analytical, quantitative, report writing and communication skills. These are widely recognised by employers and enhance your employability in the workplace.

The Bachelor of Science (Psychology) can be followed by an Honours year to provide a pathway to professional practice as a psychologist and postgraduate study.

## **Bachelor of Philosophy, Neuroscience, and Psychology**

The Bachelor of Philosophy, Neuroscience, and Psychology (BPNP) program draws upon the Australian National University's world-leading strengths in philosophy, neuroscience and psychology to take you on a pioneering and interdisciplinary academic journey. The program will foster a unique environment where innovation, collaboration, and cutting-edge research converge to challenge traditional boundaries of thought.

## **Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours) (PhB)**

This is a four-year degree program with a high entry standard providing the opportunity for students to undertake an individualised program of courses in psychology. As a Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours) student, you will go beyond the normal limits of undergraduate education and work closely with an academic supervisor or mentor in most of your courses.

## **Bachelor of Science & Bachelor of Arts**

The Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts are three-year degrees in which students can major in Psychology. Both of these degrees allow progression to the fourth year Psychology Honours program if students complete an accredited sequence of psychology courses, requiring additional courses beyond the Psychology major.

## Flexible Double Degree

### Bachelor degree + Bachelor degree

Study two undergraduate degrees at the same time and graduate with two qualifications.

- Double your job prospects.
- It takes less time than studying two undergraduate degrees separately.
- Same full-time workload per year as studying a single undergraduate degree.

ANU offers a flexible degree structure where you can study two undergraduate degrees and graduate with two qualifications (subject to university entry mark). This means you can combine your psychology degree with any other degree, such as music, law, commerce, or finance – the possibilities are limited only by your imagination! You can also combine Arts and Science degrees. We are constantly developing courses that will allow you to combine psychology with other areas of interest. All you need to do is ask.

## Honours year

Applicants who have completed the required APAC accredited sequence of courses as part of a Bachelor of Science (Psychology), Bachelor Philosophy (Honours), Bachelor of Arts degree may apply to progress to the Psychology Honours year.

The minimum requirements for admission include:

- A weighted average mark equivalent to an ANU 70 per cent calculated from the 36 units (i.e. 0.75 EFTSL) of psychology courses, excluding 1000 level introductory undergraduate courses, with the highest marks.
- APAC accredited sequence of undergraduate courses.

Admission to this program is on a competitive basis; meeting the minimum requirements for admission does not guarantee entry to the program. The Psychology Honours year has a quota on places due to availability of supervision with 80 per cent of places reserved for ANU undergraduate students.

Where ranking of applications is required, the weighted average mark of the best ten 2000- and 3000-level Psychology courses will be used to determine the selection rank. The Honours program involves a concentrated fourth year and builds significantly on the knowledge and skills that you have developed during your undergraduate degree.

It is an exciting time of professional and intellectual development when you immerse yourself in psychology and become better acquainted with the central features of academic life such as seminars, workshops, presentation of work to colleagues, research design and communication of scientific findings. It is, in other words, a time when you take charge of your emerging career in psychology.

# Graduate degrees in Psychology

## Professional training opportunities for graduates

Completion of an Honours degree at the upper second class level or better makes you eligible to apply for several graduate programs we offer, including the research PhD, as well as the Master of Clinical Psychology and the PhD (Clinical Psychology). These graduate clinical psychology options enable you to practice as a registered psychologist at the completion of your studies and eventually gain endorsement as a clinical psychologist. An alternative pathway to becoming a registered psychologist is to complete the fourth and fifth years of study in the Master of Professional Psychology (MPP). This is a two-year postgraduate program which does not require an Honours year, with applicants requiring a three-year APAC-accredited sequence in psychology. This pathway enables graduates to apply for general registration with the Psychology Board of Australia after completing a one-year internship and the National Psychology Exam.

## Studying Clinical Psychology

The graduate study of clinical psychology at ANU will allow you to gain a professional qualification as a clinical psychologist through the two-year Master of Clinical Psychology (MCP) degree or four-year PhD (Clinical Psychology) degree.

In the formal teaching environment at ANU, your focus will be on developing high-level practical skills within the strong theoretical foundation that is essential to being a highly competent clinical psychologist.

The coursework is taught in small group formats and integrates contemporary clinical models for the assessment and treatment of psychological disorders with concentrated clinical skills training. At ANU all clinical training is strictly evidence-based.

Whether you decide to study for two or four years, you will work closely with dedicated clinical psychologists at the University and in local hospitals and other health services. You will gain supervised experience working in a range of professional settings such as drug and alcohol, crisis intervention, child and family therapy, clinical neuropsychology, adult mental health, geriatric psychology and general medical psychology. In these placements, you will be guided and supported at all times by professional clinical psychologists. In addition to your clinical coursework and placement experiences, you will also conduct a program of original clinical research under the guidance of a dedicated research supervisor based at ANU.

## Studying Professional Psychology

The ANU Master of Professional Psychology (MPP) is a two-year (full-time) program that offers the shortest route to a professional career in psychology.

This APAC accredited program has been designed to provide the 4th and 5th years of study in a single Professional Masters program for people seeking to progress down the 5+1 pathway to professional registration as a psychologist.

This practical degree provides a scientist-practitioner approach to professional psychology practice that combines evidence-based psychological theory, practice and research. It includes coursework on psychological assessment, interventions, ethics and professional skills; a group research project in the first year and practical experience in the second year. In this program, you will work with clinical researchers and registered psychologists to develop your knowledge and skills in research and professional practice.

## The ANU Psychology Clinic

As part of your clinical training you will also work at the ANU Psychology Clinic which is based on campus. This is a research, training and treatment centre offering specialised psychological services to the community. The Clinic aims to provide the highest standards in psychological assessment and treatment in a professional, responsive and caring environment. It provides assessments and therapies for children and adults who may be experiencing a range of psychological problems. Therapy is provided individually or within groups, and is strictly founded upon the most contemporary evidence-based best practices. The University employs specialist clinical psychologists to provide supervised experience in the Clinic.

# Pathways to become a psychologist

In Australia, to register as a psychologist, you are required to complete approved university training and supervised practice.

At ANU, we offer three degree pathways accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) that enable you to pursue a career as a registered psychologist in Australia.

The pathways are open to domestic and international students, who can apply to enter each phase of our pathways, such as Bachelors and Honours degree, or Masters level. Interested students are required to follow the admissions process and apply for each degree program. More information about the pathways are available below.

## Master of Professional Psychology Pathway

Duration: 6 years full time



### STEP 1

#### ANU bachelor degree majoring in Psychology

There are three APAC accredited bachelor programs at ANU that allow you to complete psychology courses that are required for admission into the Master of Professional Psychology: Bachelor of Science (Psychology), Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts.

### STEP 2

#### Master of Professional Psychology

This program is accredited by APAC and is the first in Australia to provide both the fourth and fifth years of university study in the 5+1 pathway to registering as a psychologist. You will complete coursework on psychological assessment, interventions, professional ethics and skills, and research projects in both years of the program, including a group research project in the first year, and practical placement experience in the second year.

Upon successful completion of the first year (48 units) of the Master of Professional Psychology, you will need to obtain Provisional Registration with the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA) and satisfy other requirements to enrol into the second year of the program. You will need to maintain Provisional Registration for the duration of the program.

### STEP 3

#### Internship and National Psychology Exam

You must undertake 1,500 hours of internship training in the field under the auspices of the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA). This can be completed in a full-time or equivalent part-time arrangement.

During the internship, you will complete the National Psychology Exam. On successful completion of the internship and exam, trainees will be eligible to apply for General Registration as a Psychologist. Note: The internship is organised by students. More information can be found on the PsyBA website.

#### Apply for General Registration

## Master of Clinical Psychology Pathway

Duration: 6 years full time



### STEP 1

#### ANU Psychology Honours

At ANU you can choose from Bachelor of Arts (Honours), Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours), Bachelor of Science (Honours) and Bachelor of Science (Psychology) (Honours). Note: some of these programs are completed as three-year bachelor degrees with an additional fourth honours year. You need to apply for admission for the Psychology Honours year.

### STEP 2

#### Master of Clinical Psychology

In this program you will study clinical coursework, undertake clinical field placement and conduct clinical research.

You will complete clinically relevant coursework over the two years of the Masters. In the first year you will undertake supervised clinical practice in the ANU Psychology Clinic, and in the second year complete two supervised clinical placements outside ANU. In addition to 1,000 hours of clinical coursework, you will also conduct an approved empirical research project.

Students are required to apply for provisional registration at the commencement of the Masters course and remain provisionally registered over the duration of the course.

### STEP 3

#### Apply for General Registration

Do not need to complete the national psychology exam.

### STEP 4

#### Obtain Clinical Psychology Endorsement

Graduates from this pathway can apply for general registration with the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA), however in order to obtain clinical endorsement, you are required to complete a 3,000-hour registrar program.

## Doctor of Philosophy (Clinical Psychology) Pathway

Duration: 4 years full-time to complete the doctoral program; 8 years including undergraduate degree.

This APAC accredited doctorate degree consists of coursework, 1,000 hours of clinical placements and a research thesis (equivalent to a PhD research thesis in size and scope). It is designed for those who have a particular interest in the academic and research aspects of clinical psychology.

You can apply for general registration upon successful completion of the Doctor of Philosophy (Clinical Psychology) without taking the national psychology exam, however in order to obtain clinical endorsement, you are required to complete a 2,250 hour registrar program.

## FAQ

### How to apply for the Honours year in psychology at ANU if I complete my bachelor at another Australian University?

External applications are welcome. If your undergraduate Psychology degree was earned from an [APAC accredited program](#) and fulfills all of the ANU course requirements needed for Honours entry, then you will be eligible to apply for Psychology Honours at ANU. Note: the ANU grading criteria will be applied (e.g. if ANU has a higher cut-off than your institution, we will apply the ANU cut-off).

### How to apply for a Psychology Masters at ANU if I completed my degrees elsewhere?

Australian Psychological Society Assessment is required if you studied outside of Australia, APAC Accredited sequence of study is required if you studied in Australia.

# Research opportunities in Psychology

We place a high value on the conduct and reporting of original research by our staff and students. Our Masters and PhD graduates have been offered postdoctoral and academic positions in some of the most prestigious universities and research laboratories in the world. Research in Psychology at ANU focuses on broad research groups.

## Clinical Psychology

The Clinical Psychology group conducts research on issues related to understanding and treating psychological disorders and distress, models of psychological adjustment, the interface between health and psychology and models of mental health service delivery. It runs a training clinic that provides psychological assessment and therapy services to students and the community and research support to students and academic staff.

## Cognition and Perception

The Cognition and Perception Group conducts research in the areas of visual perception, cognition and attention, face processing, decision making, human memory, belief formation and language. Together this group advances our understanding of attention and cognitive control in everyday environments, how we process faces and anticipate others' emotions, how to address misinformation and mistakes in human decision making more broadly, and how consciousness, inner speech, and the interaction between action, perception, and cognition are computed in the healthy, diseased, and developing brain.

## Developmental Psychology

The Developmental Psychology Group (Child, Youth and Aging) spans many sub-disciplines of applied and theoretical psychology, examining topics including language development in the early years, psychopathology across childhood and adolescence, youth resilience, social and emotional wellbeing, and how the social climate of schools affects student outcomes.

## Human Neuroscience

The Human Neuroscience Group investigates the biological mechanisms underlying inner and overt speech, attention, autobiographical memory, stress, addiction, and several neurological and mental disorders. They utilise a variety of methods including neuropsychological assessment, EEG, functional and structural MRI, pharmacological challenges, TMS/tRNS, eye-tracking, and brain-computer interfaces.

## Research Methods

The Research Methods group has significant expertise in quantitative and qualitative approaches, publishing original contributions in quantitative research methods as well as undergraduate textbooks and advanced researcher handbooks.

## Social Psychology

The Social Psychology Group advances basic theory and research, while contributing to national conversation and leadership, by providing the science underpinning behavioural strategies to promote positive social change, as well as individual and community health and wellbeing, including examining the psychology of identity, leadership, prejudice, justice, responses to climate change, extremism, partisan truth, and education.

# Unique opportunities for International study

We have partnership arrangements with institutions around the world that may provide international students credit for study undertaken at our partner institutions and/or pathways into our degrees.

A joint undergraduate program between ANU and Southwest University in Chongqing, China, gives students an opportunity to undertake two years of study in China and two years in Canberra. When in China, some subjects are taught by ANU staff in English. Students graduate with a degree from both universities.

We also have a credit arrangement for students studying a Diploma in psychology studies at Temasek Polytechnic, Singapore.

## Recognition of qualifications by overseas professional bodies

Students who reside outside Australia should check with their local professional and/or registration bodies regarding the level of recognition they give to Australian qualifications in psychology.



## Accreditation of programs

All undergraduate and graduate programs in psychology offered by ANU are fully accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council. The graduate programs in clinical psychology are also fully approved for membership with the Australian Psychological Society (APS) and the Australian Clinical Psychology Association. Our graduates in fourth year and beyond are eligible for registration as a psychologist with the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA) at a level of registration dependent on their level of qualification. Eligibility for associate or full membership of the APS is also conferred by our degrees.

Whether you undertake graduate professional training and become a practicing and registered psychologist, or you choose to employ the more general skills gained from an undergraduate education in psychology, you will be superbly prepared for an exciting and well paid career after your graduation. Your future jobs, either as a professional psychologist, or broad skillset acquired over the course of your psychology degree, might entail:

- Designing evidence-based interventions to solve a host of human problems
- Assessing and treating mental health challenges
- Studying accident prevention
- Designing educational material
- Researching how people function in different environments
- Designing and implementing recruitment and selection policies
- Helping children and adults to read more effectively
- Promoting healthy behaviours
- Helping to modify work or school environments to achieve better individual adjustment
- Helping organisations manage and improve the performance of staff, designing surveys and market research
- Helping to support behaviour change to deal with major social challenges (e.g., climate change, social cohesion, etc.)
- Assisting people to lead happier, healthier lives

# Apply for a scholarship

ANU offers a number of scholarships on a merit basis. You can also talk to your academic supervisor about other sources of funding you might access to assist with living expenses and tuition fees, since full-time research students are normally allowed to work no more than 10 hours per week.

Please note, international research scholarships are only awarded to outstanding students and are extremely competitive. If you are a domestic student and applying for mid-year entry, your chances of obtaining scholarship funding may be greatly diminished.
